Telephone Usage

Dial '9' for an Outside Line

Dial '0' for Reception

Dial '3' followed by the room number to phone another room

The charges for telephone calls, local and international, from your room are per metered unit and will be shown on your bill.

Windows

All windows in your room are unlocked. To open them press down on the lock button, turn the handle upwards and push the window out.

Lights

The lights are activated by placing your Key Card in the wall mounted slot beside the bedroom door.

Room Service

Room service is available from 07:00 until 21:00. To place your order, dial "0".

To order Breakfast to your room, tick your choice on the Breakfast Menu hanging on the back of the door (before 5am). There is a €5 per Tray Charge.

Heating

To place a breakfast order, please fill out the form hanging on the back of your door and leave on outside of door for collection before 05:00.

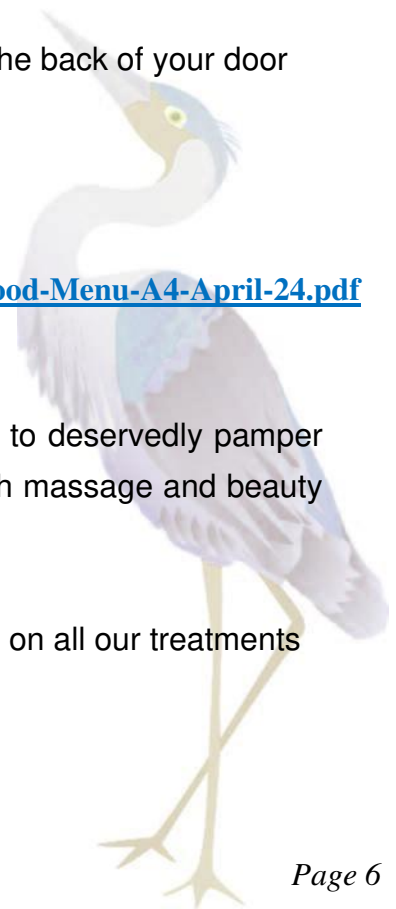

History of 'Swords', Co. Dublin & Swords Landmarks

The busy village of Swords lies west of Malahide. Legend has it that Swords was founded at a well, blessed by St. Colmcille. The ancient ruins of a Round Tower can be found in the grounds of the Church of Ireland. Swords is a bustling town, which is growing rapidly and whose location near Dublin Airport gives it a prominent position in Irish life. Recent developments impacting on life in Swords include the Pavilions shopping mall and the new M1 motorway, opened in June 2003.

Swords Castle

The castle was built around 1200 as an Episcopal manor. It is 5-sided, enclosing a courtyard of considerable size. It is entered by a strong gateway with a porter's room on the left, and on the right a priest's room with remains of mid-13th century windows and a first floor reached by a spiral staircase. Beyond it is a chapel from the fourteenth century, with parts of an original tiled floor; its windows have been built up. The tower at the north end of the wall was the residence of the Constable of the Castle. The crenulations are 15th century. A weekly court was held in the castle, and Queen Elizabeth I gave the town municipal rights in 1578. There is a Round Tower in the grounds of the Church of Ireland church about 200 yards to the south-west of the castle.

Saint Columbus Church

SORD COLUMBCILLE is the ancient name of this town, meaning "the well of pure water of the dove of the Church". The "Dove" means St. Columba, (from "Colombe" a dove). His sanctity caused him to be called the "Dove of the Church" (from the Latin "Cella"). The well is the one which the Saint caused to be made, which can still be found, near this place, a well of pure water, used to this day. St. Columba founded the town about 560 A.D. He left Ireland in 563 A.D. to go to Iona, so the town's earliest date could be soon after the Saint founded Durrow in 553. The Church was designed by a Mr. Trench of Hayward, near Ballynakill, and the architect was Mr. William Farrell of Dublin. The cost of the Church was then £2200.

The Courthouse

On the site of the old Bullring in North Street now stands the Courthouse – an imposing building of cut-stone which was designed by Alexander Tate in 1845. Here, a Bench of magistrates or JPs (Justices of the Peace) presided to hear of petty offences and sometimes to hold preliminary hearings for cases destined for higher courts. The courthouse today continues to serve the same purpose.

The Old Vicarage

This beautiful building dates back to the seventeenth century but its excellent state of repair is due to the refurbishment carried out by a Rev. Joseph Espine in the 1730's, and later alterations carried out in 1872 when the vicarage was bought back by the Swords Vestry.

Saint Colmcilles Church and Graveyard

This classical-style church was built in 1827. Its site was donated by James J. Taylor of Swords House. The church has been altered over the years. A two storey vestry was added to the rear in 1879 and in 1924 the facade was altered by Francis P. Russell. Among those interred in the graveyard are some prominent legends in Irish history, most notably A.J. Kettle (1833-1916), the famous Irish patriot who was known as Parnell's "right hand man".

Carnegie Library

Andrew Carnegie (1835-1919) was a Scottish born US industrialist and philanthropist who established several trusts for education and research. This included the establishment of many public libraries in English speaking countries. At the turn of the century a library committee was formed in Swords and the Carnegie Trust was approached for financial assistance. A site was acquired on North Street and by 1908 the library was open to the public. Today the library houses the Swords Museum and the family Law Courts.

The Round Tower

Irish Round Towers were built from 800 A.D. to 1000 A.D., during the Viking invasions. They were built near churches & monastic sites, for the safety of clergy, shrines and treasures: also as watch towers and belfries. The Swords Round Tower is 75 feet high and 55 feet in circumference. It has a diameter of 18 feet. It was probably higher originally, because the upper portion was rebuilt several times during the 1400 A.D. and 1700 A.D. period. The cross on the top is dated from about 1702 A.D. The proportions would indicate that the top was then shortened. The lower part of the Tower is now hidden under centuries of accumulated rubble around the base, as these doorways were always 15 feet or so above ground level. The Towers were entered by a ladder, which was pulled up into the interior. There are projecting stones inside the walls to support four floors, which were connected by a series of ladders inside.

The Square Tower

This tower was built in the 1300's and is the only remaining part of the Abbey, which was once here and the chapel in which Brian Boru was waked after his death in the Battle of Clontarf in 1014. To one of his learned followers, St Finian, he gave one of his missals and appointed him as the first Abbot.
